Boba & Backpacks at AD 25 School Supply Drive



In July, Assemblymember Ash Kalra hosted another successful school supply drive in his district, this time in collaboration with Sacred Heart Community Service. He has been leading this initiative every year since his tenure on the City Council, with a dedicated focus on aiding the children of underserved families. Sacred Heart, this year's co-host, also conducted their own Back-to-School supply drive this summer.

In the past two years following the pandemic, the Assembly-member and his office partnered with Happy Lemon on Coleman Avenue for the school supply drive. Each community member who dropped off a kind donation or eligible school supply items, such as new backpacks, unused notebooks, rul-

ers, pens, pencils, etc., in person during the specified time window at the location, received a complimentary drink as a special thank-you from the Assemblymember.

"I am immensely proud of my community for consistently stepping up each year to donate crucial school supplies to my drives and others, ensuring our students and teachers are well-prepared for another academic year," shared Assemblymember Kalra immediately after the conclusion of the drive.

According to Sacred Heart's estimates, the organization was able to raise sufficient funds and supplies from all the school supply drives, including ours, to provide 760 transitional kindergarten and kindergarten children, 1,572 first to fifth graders, and 1,462 sixth to twelfth graders with free backpacks.

The Assemblymember and his District Office extend their heartfelt gratitude to Sacred Heart Community Service and the Happy Lemon store on Coleman Ave. for their generous support and collaboration.

Latino Heritage Celebration: Honoring Community Leaders

Assemblymember Ash Kalra's Annual Latino Heritage Month Celebration, held late September, honors the rich history and culture of the Latino community. The event not only highlights these cultural contributions, but also recognizes the invaluable commitment of Latino/Latinx leaders within Assembly District 25.

For seven consecutive years, this event has found its home at Mezcal, a restaurant nestled in the heart of Downtown San José. Mezcal's unique ambiance, blending brick exteriors, intricate metalwork, and indigenous Mexican motifs, provides an authentic cultural experience. What truly sets Mezcal apart is its dedication to preserving and sharing authentic Oaxacan regional cuisine, rooted in cherished family recipes passed down through generations. Every dish, from Estofado to Mole Negro, pays homage to these time-honored flavors and techniques.

Ysabel Duron, a pioneering and award-winning Latina journalist, received the longstanding Legacy Award for her outstanding contributions to the Latino community, as well as her tireless service to San José and beyond. Her journey into patient advocacy began in 1999 when she faced a cancer diagnosis, leading her to advocate for cancer patients and establish nonprofit agencies to support them. Her legacy extends to various boards and committees, including the National Cancer Advisory Board and the California Institute for Regenerative Medicine. Ysabel Duron's relentless dedication and contributions make her a true beacon of hope and a worthy Legacy Award recipient.

Flor Martinez, a prominent speaker, social media influencer, and advocate for human, labor, and immigrant rights, was honored with the Leadership in Community Service Award. Her unwavering commitment to activism, both online and offline, has made her a symbol of resilience and determination. In 2020, Martinez took her dedication to the next level by establishing The Celebration Nation Foundation, a California-based non-profit focused on serving, educating, and empowering Indigenous and Latino communities.

Jonathan Borca, Deputy Director for the School of Arts and Culture at the Mexican Heritage Plaza, received the Leadership in Art and Culture Award for his significant impact on Silicon Valley's arts and cultural scene. Hailing from Albuquerque, New Mexico, Borca's journey reflects his deep commitment to enriching cultural heritage. With over a decade of experience in program development, he played a pivotal role in directing the "California Arts Council Administrators of Color Fellowship," a statewide initiative nurturing an inclusive arts workforce. Beyond his professional achievements, Borca actively contributes to local art and music projects, solidifying his status as a cultural ambassador.

Connie Alvarez, a community leader and businesswoman, was honored with the Leadership in Business Award. Her entrepreneurial journey began while working alongside her family at their Downtown San José jewelry store. Alvarez ventured into the culinary world, founding Plaza Garibaldi Restaurant, which has since evolved into a thriving catering service. She further diversified her business portfolio with Friendship Hall. Serv-



ing as the President of the Alum Rock-Santa Clara Street Business Association, Alvarez has championed local businesses and played a pivotal role in creating a vibrant community in San José.

The Services, Immigrant Rights, and Education Network (SIREN) received the Leadership in Advocacy Award for their unwavering commitment to empowering low-income immigrants and refugees. SIREN's mission encompasses community education, leadership development, policy advocacy, civic engagement, and legal services. Their dedication to inclusivity and justice has made them a leading force in advocating for immigrant and refugee rights.

The Moon Festivals Delivers Joy (and Lanterns) to Children in AD25!

September is the month of the midautumn season according to the lunar calendar. For many Asian American communities, including Vietnamese, Chinese, Korean, and beyond, it is an auspicious occasion to celebrate the Moon Festival, or Full Moon Festival. In Vietnamese culture, it is known as "Tết Trung Thu," in Chinese, it is called 中秋节, and in South Korean culture, it is honored as 추석. While there are different versions of the festival in each respective culture, they all share common features and meanings, aside from being celebrated annually in the same month. The festival derives its name from the perception of a full moon symbolizing wholeness, unity, and togetherness, values highly prioritized in the AAPI community. These two images figuratively and harmoniously resemble one another.



Additionally, the festival is also famously known as the Children's Moon Festival, a tradition encouraging parents and adults to gift children beautifully decorated lanterns adorned with creative patterns, colors, and designs, such as fish, stars, or even superheroes from popular culture. Families and children also come together to share tasty mooncakes.

This year, Assemblymember Ash Kalra is participating in three meaningful community events that celebrate the spirit of the Moon Festival. The International Children Assistance Network of Silicon Valley, a nonprofit organization, hosted the festival at the Vietnamese American Cultural Center with a "Back to School" theme, aiming to provide assistance and support for children at the start of the school year. The annual Children's Moon Festival at Yerba Buena High School marks its 32nd year, and Assemblymember Kalra sponsored both Moon Festivals. He also felt honored to attend the Full Moon Festival (Chu-Seok) hosted by Korean American Community Services, a lively celebration featuring a health and wellness fair.

"I'm truly grateful for the numerous wonderful Moon Festivals for our children and families. It's always heart-warming to see so many families enjoying the festivities," Assemblymember Kalra shared. He added that as a child growing up in a diverse city like San Jose, he sometimes found inspiration and joy in the meaning of this festival during difficult days whenever he received a beautiful lantern from a community event.

\$1.5 Million Secured in State Budget for Lake Cunningham Restoration



On July 31st, Assemblymember Ash Kalra stood before press and an excited crowd to present a \$1.5 million check to the City of San José. This funding, secured in the state budget, marked the long overdue start of the Lake Cunningham restoration project.

For more than four decades, the 50-acre Lake Cunningham has been a cherished landmark for locals. Beyond its role as an urban oasis, it has offered vital opportunities for outdoor recreation, catering to the diverse community that calls this area home. Unfortunately, the

water quality of the lake has been in gradual decline, reaching a point where it now poses a threat to visitors. Fishing, boating, swimming, and even simple contact with the water had become perilous activities.

Recognizing the urgency of the situation, Asm. Kalra championed this significant investment, the majority of which will be directed towards creating wetlands around the lake. These wetlands will act as natural filters to remove contaminants. Additionally, part of the budget will replace existing turf with native plants, promoting biodiversity and discouraging non-native geese that contribute to water quality problems.

"I would like to thank the City of San José, Councilmember Candelas, and Councilmember Ortiz for all the work they have done to advocate for the restoration of Lake Cunningham. Lake Cunningham presents a unique opportunity to restore both crucial wetland habitat and important outdoor recreation infrastructure. I am extremely proud to initiate this key investment in our environmental and community health."

Resilience & Unity: Reflecting on the 22nd Anniversary of 9/11

On September 10th, 2023, Assemblymember Ash Kalra had the honor of attending and speaking at Senator Dave Cortese's 22nd-anniversary commemoration of the fateful events of September 11, 2001. San José Community Joins Honorees & Trailblazers at AD 25 Pride Month

In August, Assemblymember Ash Kalra's Pride Celebration 2023 honored distinguished community leaders for their tireless advocacy for love, equity, inclusivity, and diversity. The Assemblymember was honored to partner with Project MORE to host a public, in-person celebration at Qmunity District on Post Street. Qmunity District, championed by the Project MORE Foundation, is a welcoming, inclusive, unique business district and an affirming place that celebrates the art, culture, and history of the LGBTQ+ community.

For the first time since before the COVID-19 Pandemic, the Assemblymember was pleased to invite the public to join him in celebrating the advocacy and stellar accomplishments of the following honorees at Assembly District 25's Pride Celebration 2023:

Legacy Award: Reverend Lindi Ramsden (she/her) helped create a culture of allyship and acceptance in the congregation. Despite a lack of openly LGBTQ+ ministers being called to serve California congregations, in 1985, the First Unitarian Church of San José invited Rev. Ramsden to serve as their minister, and during her 18-year tenure and leadership as Senior Minister, the congregation grew rapidly, becoming deeply involved in justice ministries.

Community Spirit Award: WooWoo Monroe (she/her) has dedicated 11 years to becoming Silicon Valley's beloved Queen of Camp. As the first drag queen to perform at the San José City Council meeting, she has emerged as a strong advocate for historically marginalized communities and has raised over \$80,000 for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society through her Cancer's a Drag fundraisers.

Leader in Advocacy: Drew Lloyd (he/him) serves as the Board President of the Bay Area Municipal Elections Committee and has been actively involved in nonprofit work, including volunteering on the board of the Billy DeFrank Center. With extensive experience from over 100 jury trials and a successful career, he offers a distinctive perspective and executive management expertise to the board.

Leader in Community Empowerment: Crystal Haney (she/they), the current Community Outreach Specialist for the County of Santa Clara, has over a decade of experience in supporting diverse communities, making a positive impact in the Bay Area. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Crystal took on the noble role of a Disaster Service Worker to assist mass testing sites for almost two years, effectively saving many lives.

Leader in Education: The PRIDE Center at San José State University offers educational outreach and continues advocacy for the safety and well-being of LGBTQ+ students. Furthermore, the PRIDE Center's tireless advocacy inspires each student's leadership development and equity-centered approach to connect with their peers and create new inclusive communities.

Assemblymember Kalra shared after the celebration, "AD 25 Pride Celebration continues overflowing with gratitude and joy! Thank you to our incredible honorees for empowering our


