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AD25 Honors Trailblazers During Women's History Month



March was formally proclaimed California's Women's History Month and Asm. Ash Kalra was honored to attend the 3rd Annual Women's Heritage Day, which highlighted the exemplary leadership of women in our community. It was a day full of festivities at History Park in San José, where people enjoyed traditional and modern performances, and visited local food and art vendors. Asm. Kalra joined many local community members and elected officials in attendance.

"I want to thank History San José,

Mosaic America, La Raza Historical Society of Santa Clara Valley, and other community partners for empowering diverse voices and preserving the history of women's leadership," Asm. Kalra shared.

Additionally, Asm. Kalra recognized Dr. Cynthia Teniente-Matson, President of San José State University, as his Assembly District 25's Woman of the Year Honoree. The State Assembly hosted Dr. Teniente-Matson at a welcoming reception in the State Capitol at the beginning of March.

Amid the significant changes and attacks from the federal administration on women's rights across the country, Asm. Kalra is committed to working with his colleagues in the State Capitol to protect the dignity and rights of all Californians, especially members of the targeted communities, during this challenging time.



A Message From Assemblymember Ash Kalra

Dear Friends,

Welcome to the first quarterly newsletter of this exciting legislative session! It remains my greatest honor to represent California's 25th Assembly District and to continue advocating for meaningful initiatives that uplift and support our vibrant community.

I'm thrilled to share with you a few of the twenty bills I have introduced this session, aimed to improve the quality of life for all Californians:

- AB 1157 Affordable Rent Act With many families facing unprecedented rent hikes, I introduced AB 1157, the Affordable Rent Act, to provide meaningful relief and stability. This bill lowers the state's rent increase cap, extends essential protections to renters in single-family homes, and ensures these safeguards remain permanent. California's housing affordability crisis demands decisive action, and this legislation helps protect families from displacement and reduces the risk of homelessness.
- **AB 251 Justice for Elder Abuse Victims** Our elders deserve dignity and safety. AB 251 ensures elderly and dependent adults who suffer from abuse or neglect in nursing homes have increased access to justice. This bill also holds facilities accountable, discouraging them from destroying or concealing crucial evidence during investigations.
- **AB 326 CSU Audits** Accountability and transparency in education are fundamental. AB 326 requires external audits of each California State University campus every three years, with results publicly accessible, strengthening oversight and accountability within our CSU system.
- **AB 347 CLASS Act** Promoting compassion in education, the CLASS Act empowers students by informing them of their right to opt out of animal dissections in science classes. It ensures students receive alternative assignments, respecting their ethical choices without compromising their educational experience.

As we enter April, I reflect deeply on the 50th Anniversary of Black April Day, a solemn occasion marking the

forced migration of millions of Vietnamese who sought freedom and dignity here in the United States and beyond. It is truly a privilege to represent the largest Vietnamese community in the United States, a community whose resilience and strength have profoundly shaped our district. Your contributions continue to enrich our shared heritage and democracy, inspiring us all.

I look forward to seeing you soon at community gatherings throughout Assembly District 25. Please know my office is always open to you—don't hesitate to reach out!

AD 25 Celebrates Women's History Month in Downtown San José



On March 27th, Asm. Ash Kalra hosted Assembly District 25's 2025 Women's History Month Celebration at SP2 Communal Bar & Restaurant in downtown San José. The annual event brought community members together to recognize five exceptional women and organizations whose leadership continues to shape the region.

In his opening remarks, Asm. Kalra highlighted the significance of the moment: "This is a time to honor the stories, struggles, and accomplishments of women past and present—and to uplift the women leading us into the future." He emphasized the diversity and strength of the honorees, noting their

shared commitment to justice, equity, and community empowerment.

The Leadership in Community award was presented to Kathy Sutherland, a longtime Delmas Park resident and neighborhood advocate. Kathy has played a central role in shaping local engagement efforts—from founding the Delmas Park Neighborhood Association to co-creating the Diridon Area Neighborhood Group. Her service on the Santa Clara Valley Open Space Authority, the Water District's Independent Monitoring Committee, and the Airports Commission reflects her deep dedication to sustainability and civic life.

Chris Patterson-Simmons received the Leadership in Business award for her years of entrepreneurial leadership and advocacy. As the owner of Neu2U Thrift Boutique and founder of CP Simmons Designs, Chris brings creativity and heart to the downtown small business community. She is also the first African American woman to chair East Village San José and served on several city and regional economic recovery, and transit groups.

The Leadership in Education award went to AAUW San José, one of the oldest and most active branches of the American Association of University Women. With over 200 members and four Community Action Projects,



the organization raised more than \$150,000 in scholarship funds in 2024 alone—supporting 19 local women in completing their college degrees. Under the leadership of President Tynka Dees, AAUW San José continues to create opportunities for women and girls at every stage of life.

This year's Susan Hammer Legacy Award was awarded to Dolores Alvarado, CEO of Community Health Partnership. With a public health career spanning nearly five decades, Dolores has led efforts in perinatal care, health equity, and immigrant and farmworker advocacy. Her work is grounded in lived experience and an unwavering commitment to human rights and dignity.

Dr. Cynthia Teniente-Matson, President of San José State University, was named the 2025 Woman of the Year. A nationally recognized leader in higher education, Dr. Teniente-Matson has championed student success, institutional equity, and innovation throughout her career. Since joining SJSU in 2023, she has helped position the university as a vital engine of opportunity in Silicon Valley.

The evening closed with gratitude to the honorees and to SP2 for hosting. Each of the awardees was recognized not only for their leadership but for the lasting impact they continue to make across San José and beyond.

Assembly District 25 Celebrates the Return of Tet Parade & More



Asm. Ash Kalra always feels honored to represent one of the most vibrant and diverse districts in California, which boasts a significant Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) community. As the City of San José is home to one of the largest Vietnamese diasporas in the United States, it's no surprise that our constituents get to observe the beauty and cultural significance of the Lunar New Year, also known as Tết or Xuân, the Vietnamese version of the celebration. Tết marks the beginning of the lunar calendar year and is the most important traditional holiday in Vietnam. It is a time for families and community members to reunite, remember their ancestors, and celebrate a fresh start with joy, hope, gratitude, and possibilities.

Asm. Kalra has been a strong supporter and participant in the celebrations over the years. Whether it's participating in the Tết parade, joining community leaders for special ceremonies, or enjoying the many cultural festivals, Asm. Kalra is committed to recognizing the significance of this meaningful season for the Vietnamese community.



This year, Asm. Kalra is delighted to attend nearly every major Tét celebration in our district, which is full of festivities, lion dances, cultural performances, delicious foods, and the giving of lucky red envelopes as a symbol of good luck and prosperity for the new year. In January, Kalra joined his colleagues in Sacramento—Asm.s Patrick Ahrens, Alex Lee, and Senator Aisha Wahab—in co-hosting a Bay Area Lunar New Year Luncheon, where state legislators discussed priorities and initiatives related to AAPI empowerment in civic engagement with community leaders and elected officials at the county and city levels. He also participated in the Tét parade and the annual festival jointly hosted by the Vietnamese American Roundtable and the NorCal Union of Vietnamese Student Associations, which showed a beautiful display of Vietnamese culture and tradition. Kalra especially acknowledges the hard work of both organizations in bringing the Tét parade back to our district after more than 15 years.

In February, Kalra was invited to the delightful annual Vietnamese New Year Celebration hosted by the Vietnamese Catholic Community of the Diocese of San José at the San José History Park. He also celebrated with our community, the 10th anniversary of USTAR Productions' Tết Festival at the Eastridge Center and recognized Ms. Jody Ngo's leadership in continuing to host one of the largest Tết Festivals in the Bay Area in our district.

A proud member of the AAPI community and the first Asian American to be appointed Chair of the Assembly Judiciary Committee, Kalra emphasized that Tết and Lunar New Year are festive seasons for everyone to learn more about the diverse cultures that make up the heritage and strength of our nation. "The Tết celebration is a reminder of the strength and resilience of the Vietnamese American and AAPI community," Kalra said. "It's an opportunity to celebrate family, culture, and the shared values that bind us together.



Asm. Ash Kalra Hosts Black History Month Honoree Celebration



In a night filled with reflection, celebration, and recognition, Asm. Ash Kalra hosted the Black History Month Honoree Celebration at First AME Zion Church, bringing together community members to honor the legacy and contributions of Black leaders in Assembly District 25 and beyond. The event served as a powerful reminder of the resilience, impact, and continued excellence of the Black community.

Opening the evening, Asm. Kalra expressed deep gratitude to First AME Zion Church for providing a space to gather in unity and celebrate Black history. He spoke about the importance of recognizing Black excellence not just in February, but every day, as the contributions of Black leaders have shaped the community in countless ways.

The celebration also paid tribute to the late Jeff Moore, a tireless advocate for justice and equality whose leadership continues to inspire the community. As the former President of the San José NAACP and co-founder of the Black Leadership Kitchen Cabinet, Moore dedicated his life to fighting for racial justice and ensuring that Black voices were heard in local policy and governance. Kalra reflected on Moore's profound influence, not only in activism but also as a mentor and friend. "His leadership shaped everything from the water we drink to the criminal justice system," Kalra said. "His legacy reminds us that we must continue the fight for justice with compassion and unity."

Following the tribute, the evening shifted to recognizing individuals who have made extraordinary contributions to their fields and to the broader community. Regina Williams was honored for her leadership in affordable housing and community development. With more than 17 years of experience, she has been a driving force behind efforts to create stable housing solutions for families across Silicon Valley. Through her work at SV@Home and service on multiple boards, Williams has helped shape housing policies and programs that have changed lives. Her recognition as one of San José Spotlight's 15 most influential Black leaders underscores the impact of her work.

The celebration continued with the recognition of Dr. Melissa C. Brown, an Assistant Professor at Santa Clara University and a passionate advocate for Black women and girls in education. Her research on the impact of technology on marginalized communities has created important discussions around representation and access. Through her platform Blackfeminisms.com, she has amplified voices that are too often overlooked, creating a space for Black feminist discourse and challenging dominant narratives. Kalra praised her work, noting that her dedication to education and advocacy is transforming opportunities for future generations.

The evening also recognized the 100 Black Men of Silicon Valley, a group that has devoted decades to mentoring, educating, and empowering Black youth. Their motto, "What they see is what they'll be," reflects their commitment to ensuring young Black men have strong role models and access to opportunities that will help them thrive. Through STEM initiatives, entrepreneurship workshops, and health advocacy, the organization has played a critical role in uplifting Black families across the region. Their recognition at the event served as a testament to the power of mentorship and collective action.

Closing out the evening was the presentation of the Legacy Award to Robert Stroughter, a visionary entrepreneur and community leader whose work has left a lasting impact on Santa Clara Valley. From founding the first Black Student Union to advocating for transportation equity, Stroughter has dedicated his life to ensuring greater opportunities for Black youth and families. His organizations, Parents' Choice, Inc., (continued)

and Joyner/Payne Youth Services Agency, have provided essential services for decades, helping families navigate challenges and secure brighter futures. Kalra highlighted Stroughter's lifelong commitment to advocacy, calling his contributions "a legacy of opportunity, justice, and empowerment that will endure for generations to come."

As the evening came to a close, Asm. Kalra reflected on the importance of continuing the fight for equity and justice, urging the community to draw inspiration from the honorees. "Our honorees remind us that progress is built through dedication, activism, and unwavering commitment," he said. "Let us take their stories to heart and continue building a future rooted in justice, equity, and opportunity for all."

With heartfelt congratulations to the honorees and a renewed commitment to celebrating Black excellence, the event concluded as a powerful testament to the ongoing contributions of Black leaders in Silicon Vallev.

AACSA's 45th Annual MLK Luncheon Honors Local Leaders

Silicon Valley came together once again to honor the enduring legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. at the 45th Annual MLK Luncheon, hosted by the African American Community Service Agency (AACSA). The event brought together community leaders, advocates, and elected officials to recognize those who embody Dr. King's vision of justice, service, and empowerment.

Make a Friend for Life at San José Animal Care Center!




Thinking about adding a dog to your life? Dunkaroo is waiting—ready to bring boundless love and fun to a home that's ready for him.
